SCRIPTURE REFLECTIONS – AUGUST 2021 – CYCLE B

August 1, 2021 – 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time: In the passage from Exodus, the Lord provides the Israelites with miraculous food to sustain them in the desert. In the Gospel, the crowds ask Jesus for similar food, and he responds that he himself is the bread of life: they need to believe in him. “Truth is in Jesus,” proclaims the letter to the Ephesians. Divine Master, we renew our faith in you! (Exodus 16:2-4, 12-15, Ephesians 4:17, 20-24, John 6:24-35)

August 8, 2021 – 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time: In this Sunday’s Gospel, Jesus says, “The bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world.” It is a startling reference to the “hour” when he will hand himself over for us as a sacrificial offering. The Eucharist is food for our spiritual journey, as the hearth cake was nourishment for Elijah’s physical journey. May we never take the Eucharist for granted! (1 Kings 19:4-8, Ephesians 4:30-5:2, John 6:41-51)

August 15, 2021 – Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary: Today’s first and second readings celebrate the victory of God over the evils of sin and death. Mary’s Gospel canticle looks forward to this victory – which has begun with her. Mary was Jesus’ temple. Do we recognize that we, too, have the grace of being a temple of God? (Revelations 11:19a; 12:1-6a, 10ab, 1 Corinthians 15:20-27a, Luke 1:39-56)

August 22, 2021 – 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time: In this Sunday’s selection from Joshua, the people express their loyalty to God, who has led them out of Egypt and into the promised land. In the Gospel, Peter proclaims the disciples’ loyalty to Jesus. In the passage from Ephesians, spouses are encouraged to be loyal to one another. Lord, help us to be loyal to you and to those who are closest to us. (Joshua 24:1-2a, 15-17, 18b, Ephesians 5:21-32, John 6:60-69)


August 29, 2021 – 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time: “Be doers of the word and not hearers only,” writes James. The Ten Commandments, given at Mount Sinai, are perennially valid. However, Jesus reprimands some religious leaders for uselessly multiplying laws. Have we set up “rules” for our daily life that make genuine love for God and neighbor more difficult to practice? (Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-8, James 1:17-18, 21b-22, 27, Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23)

**Along the way, we can be inspired by the good people we meet.
This month we can ponder the words of **Saint Francis of Assisi**.**

Born in Italy circa 1181, Saint Francis of Assisi was renowned for drinking and partying in his youth. After fighting in a battle between Assisi and Perugia, Francis was captured and imprisoned for ransom.



He spent nearly a year in prison — awaiting his father's payment — and, according to legend, began receiving visions from God. After his release from prison, Francis heard the voice of Christ, who told him to repair the Christian Church and live a life of poverty. Consequently, he abandoned his life of luxury and became a devotee of the faith, his reputation spreading all over the Christian world.

Later in life, Francis reportedly received a vision that left him with the stigmata of Christ — marks resembling the wounds Jesus Christ suffered when he was crucified. He was canonized as a saint on July 16, 1228.

During his life he also developed a deep love of nature and animals and is known as the patron saint of the environment and animals; his life and words have had a lasting resonance with millions of followers across the globe. Each October, many animals the world over are blessed on his feast day.

***Remember that when you leave this earth, you can take with you nothing that you have received - only what you have given:
a full heart, enriched by honest service, love, sacrifice and courage.***

***Start by doing what's necessary; then do what's possible;
and suddenly you are doing the impossible.***
