Scripture Reflections

January 3, 2021 – Epiphany of the Lord: Here comes everyone – just as Jesus came for everyone! Today's passages from Isaiah and Matthew foreshadow the reality proclaimed in the selection from St. Paul to the Ephesians: The Church, firmly rooted in the history of ancient Israel, is for all people. We want to remember this in our daily lives and try to let Christ shine through us. (Isaiah 60:1-6, Ephesians 3:2-3a, 5-6, Matthew 2:1-12)

January 10, 2021 – Baptism of the Lord: The water theme in today's passage from Isaiah continues in the selection from the First Letter of John, where the blood and water flowing from the Savior's side may be considered symbols of Eucharist and Baptism. As a baptized child of the Father, in imitation of Jesus, our Brother, may we follow the urging of John to love God and keep his commandments. (Isaiah 55:1-11, 1 John 5:1-9, Mark 1:7-11)

January 17, 2021 – 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time: Our personal call from the Lord may not have been as dramatic as the calls of Samuel, Andrew Peter and other prophets and apostles. But we are the Lord's – We are his temple, as St. Paul says in the Second Reading, and we are called to do something for God. (1 Samuel 3:3b-10, 19, 1 Corinthians 6:13c-15a, 17-20, John 1:35-42)

January 24, 2021 – 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time: St. Paul warns, "I tell you; time is running out." In the Old Testament Book of Jonah, when time starts to run out for the Ninevites, they repent of their sins. In the Gospel, when time runs out for the John the Baptist, Jesus begins his ministry. Time may not be running out for us, but wouldn't we be wise to use our time better? (Jonah 3:1-5, 10, 1 Corinthians 7:29-31, Mark 1:14-20)

January 31, 2021 – 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time: "I will raise up...a prophet," proclaims the Lord in the reading from Deuteronomy, and "will put my words into his mouth." The early Christians saw this as a reference to Jesus, who, St. Mark says, teaches "with authority." Other teachers like St. Paul, instead, sometimes give an opinion, as in the second reading, rather than authoritative teaching. When we need answers, do we know where to find authoritative Church teaching? (Deuteronomy 18:15-20, 1 Corinthians 7:32-35, Mark 1:21-28)
