Sunday Gospel Reflections

+Fr. Bob Catlett, M.Div.

July 4, 2021 – 14th **Sunday in Ordinary Time:** "They are a rebellious house," the Lord tells the prophet Ezekiel. "A prophet is not without honor except in his native place," laments Jesus. We should remember these biblical phrases when our attempts to help others are poorly received. In putting up with weaknesses, insults, and constraints for the sake of Christ, says St. Paul, we are somehow strong. (Ezekiel 2:2-5, 2 Corinthians 12:7-10, Mark 6:1-6)

July 11, 2021 – 15th **Sunday in Ordinary Time**: In this Sunday's first reading, the prophet Amos preaches repentance to Israel. In the Gospel, Jesus sends out the Twelve for the same purpose. The selection from Ephesians gives us a glimpse of the fruits of repentance: "the forgiveness of transgressions, in accord with the riches of his grace." Is it time to reconcile ourselves with the Lord? (Amos 7:12-15, Ephesians 1:3-14, Mark 6:7-13)

July 18, 2021 – 16th **Sunday in Ordinary Time:** Speaking through Jeremiah, the Lord declares: "I myself will gather the remnant of my flock from all the lands." This is fulfilled in Jesus, who isn't simply "moved with pity for...sheep without a shepherd," but gives his very life to reconcile the human race to the Father. Do I feel like a shepherd? Can I volunteer for some kind of pastoral work? (Jeremiah 23:1-6, Ephesians 2:13-18, Mark 6:30-34)

July 25, 2021 – 17th **Sunday in Ordinary Time:** The multiplication of the loaves by Jesus recalls the multiplication of loaves by the prophet Elisha. Both foreshadow the Eucharist, where we assemble as "one body and one Spirit." Lord, help us to be more aware that the Mass manifests and builds up the body of Christ. (2 Kings 4:42-44, Ephesians 4:1-6, John 6:1-15)
